A Message from Mayor Patricia M. Randall

Hello January 2024 and all that the New Year has to offer!

From a marketing sense, the term "new" always implies something improved upon, better or a must have item. However, the implication is not always true. At least – the older I get – I hope not!

I do think that the New Year allows everyone the opportunity to leave the clutter of the previous year behind and begin with a clean slate. I view the dawn of January 1 as an imaginary line in the sand inviting us to step forward together, sharing the sense of renewal and joy of a fresh start in a new year.

I believe most people wish to exit their life having accomplished something that made the world a better place. Of course, the journey to improve anything, usually begins from within. As we declare our personal resolutions for the new year, let's keep in mind the impact each of us can have in improving our own community.

Each year we meet as a City Council to adopt specific goals that will guide us throughout the upcoming year. During our recent annual retreat, we established our priorities and plans for coordinating with staff to achieve our objectives. As with most goals – and the speed at which government works – several of our last year's initiatives will roll forward into this year.

Housing continues to be in short supply across the country and at all housing levels in Portage. Success with most development requires some level of incentives from both local and state programs due to elevated interest rates and the high cost of building materials.

The Lake Center District will continue to see improvements recommended in the Lake Center District Corridor and Placemaking Study to improve safety, mobility, and the quality of life for residents and businesses. An upcoming improvement is a four-way traffic signal to be installed at the intersection of Portage Road and Forest Drive.

Zoning updates to our ordinances will ensure we are implementing current "best practices" and maintaining our longstanding commitment to remain competitive in the market. Recent zoning changes, now allowing Accessory Dwelling Units, incorporate new trends as we address our ongoing housing crisis.

Waste hauling now requires companies who do business in Portage to publicize their rates, to ensure they are fair to all city residents. We continue to examine the benefits of using a single waste hauler which we currently offer with curbside recycling and all other household and natural debris collection programs.

Crossroads Mall is in transition and sitting on sixty acres of prime real estate. We continue to work with the management of this private property to ensure that we

maximize opportunities for future use.

The Farmers Market has soared in popularity and the properties surrounding the Portage Zhang Senior Center will be the future site of our permanent market. The allocation of \$1.75 million from the State of Michigan budget will cover the majority of the cost.

Trail improvements and connections will link Portage and Vicksburg adding three miles of trail. City Council's continued commitment to maintaining and expanding our network of trails connects us to surrounding communities and encourages destination rides that support our local businesses.

City Council will also be looking at ways we can better support our local businesses, rental community and the relocation of our Department of Public Works Department. We continue to explore options for expanding access to the Gourdneck State Game Area, as well as how best to address electric vehicle transportation.

Your City Council is excited about all the opportunities as we enter the New Year! We renew our commitment to serve you, your family and the community we share. We hope that you will consider getting involved in some way.

As we step forward together, I wish you the best in the coming year!

A Reflection on the Council-Manager Government Model in Portage

Every so often, it is worthwhile to remind ourselves why our city chose the Council Manager form of government in 1963 to ensure an effective and productive system of government in Portage. Your City Manager is a member of the Michigan Municipal Executives (MME), an association affiliated with both the Michigan Municipal League (MML) and the International City Management Association (ICMA).

The manager is appointed by the Mayor and is confirmed by majority vote of the City Council. They serve at the will of the Mayor and City Council, and the elected body is in continuous

productive communication with the manager.

Michigan Municipal Executives ensure the optimal functioning of local government. The decision to hire a professional manager in a community is an investment in effective governance and sustainable development.

Michigan Municipal Executives bring a wealth of experience and expertise to the table, navigating the complex landscape of local governance with skill and dedication. These professionals are equipped to handle the intricacies of municipal administration, from budgetary matters to community engagement initiatives. Their leadership fosters an environment of transparency, accountability, and efficiency within local government structures.

In a Council Manager form of government, elected officials play the most important role. They bridge the gap between residents and government. With their communication skills and commitment to the community, your Mayor and City Council ensure that community voices are not only heard but also actively incorporated into decision-making processes.

The merits of having a Michigan Municipal Executive at the helm of local government with constant and effective oversight by a dedicated elected body cannot be overstated. The elected body's commitment to community well-being combined with an accountable public manager steer a municipality toward a prosperous and harmonious future.

City Approves Accessory Dwelling Units to Increase Attainable Housing Options

On December 5, the City Council approved a Zoning Code Ordinance Amendment, specifically addressing Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs). This amendment aligns with the city's commitment to the 2022 Attainable Housing Plan and the FY 2023-2024 priorities, emphasizing the improvement of the Zoning Ordinance to remove obstacles to housing affordability.

ADUs, which are commonplace in various Michigan communities, such as Kalamazoo, Ann Arbor, Grand Rapids, Traverse City, Grand Haven, and Holland, are additional living spaces on a property but separated from the primary residence. These units come complete with their own kitchen, bathroom, and bedroom, providing flexibility in housing options.

ADUs serve various purposes, including offering

independent living for aging or disabled family members, generating rental income to offset mortgage costs, and providing affordable housing options for grown children or renters. Their design can be either attached to the primary residence or a detached structure, blending into the neighborhood's architectural style.

While ADUs offer numerous benefits, they may also introduce challenges. To address these challenges, the city established design standards and restrictions, parking requirements, flexibility in size while limiting placement to the R-1 (A-D) One Family Districts.

The ordinance prohibits the use of ADUs as short-term rentals and addresses potential conflicts with homeowners' associations.

This is an exciting time for Portage as we take a significant step towards addressing



Lakefront Property Housing Codes Open House

The City of Portage understands the unique physical characteristics of lakefront properties. Providing specific relief to land use challenges for single-family residences in lake neighborhoods is a City Council priority for Fiscal Year 2023-2024.

Lakefront residents are invited to visit with city staff, have an open dialogue about lakefront home reinvestment challenges, and learn about the planning process for this study. A postcard with a Lakefront Property Housing Codes Survey link and QR code was mailed to lakefront property owners in late December. The survey will also be available at the open house. Staff will utilize input from the open house and the survey, combined with a review of researched data, to identify and propose solutions and potential changes to city ordinances and/or policies.

There will be ongoing opportunities for public input, ensuring that the community remains actively involved in shaping future home building and remodeling on the lakefront. Stay

informed about additional public input opportunities and receive crucial updates by attending or tuning into Planning Commission and City Council meetings dedicated to this topic.

Lake Center District Commercial Corridor Rezoning Open House

The city is advancing its efforts to implement the Lake Center District Corridor & Placemaking Plan, which was adopted by the Portage City Council on July 13, 2021. (View the final study at portagemi.gov/870.) The goal of the study is to promote a revitalized, more walkable, mixed-use area with a focal point being the section of Portage Road nearest the convergence of West Lake and Austin Lake, commonly referred to in the plan as the "Isthmus."

A proposed rezoning for the Portage Road commercial corridor aims to promote commercial reinvestment, diversify uses and building types, and enhance connectivity with the public space. This will shape the area's character and improve consistency in the review process. With resident and community input, the goals of the corridor plan can be realized by updating the zoning code.

The Lake Center District Commercial Corridor Rezoning Open House will kick off the rezoning process. The open house will include an overview of general zoning strategies and an opportunity for feedback from those who attend. The rezoning process is expected to continue over the next six months and will have additional opportunities for public input. Master Plan Community Input Open House

The City of Portage is in the process of creating a new Master Plan that will serve as a road map for future land uses and development. The goals of the 18-month Master Plan

update process are to 1) establish where we are today, 2) define where we want to go, and 3) draw the road map to get there. We are now at step three and are ready to draw the road map for the future!

The future land use framework is the primary guide to the future physical development of the City of Portage. The draft city-wide land use map and its designations describe the desired types, intensity, and spatial arrangement of the city's future land uses to achieve the community vision described in the Master Plan. It also serves as a guide for future decisions about zoning, development, and infrastructure investments. The draft land use map is based on comments received to date during the initial input phases in the first half of 2023 and summed up by the draft land use framework reviewed by the Planning Commission in July of 2023. The draft map applies the concepts contained in the draft framework to specific locations in the city.

All Portage citizens and property owners are invited to the Master Plan Community Input Open House where the draft land use map will be reviewed. Come from 5:30 - 6 PM for open dialogue with city staff and light refreshments. The formal open house will begin at 6 PM with a brief presentation, followed by public input on the draft future land use framework. All are welcome, so please share this opportunity with friends, colleagues, and neighbors.

The process of updating the Master Plan continues after this open house. Six New Combined Industrial Development Districts Proposed

On January 9, 2024, the City Council will convene a public hearing to introduce a transformative proposal: the consolidation of 94 distinct Industrial Development Districts (IDD) into six interconnected regional districts. If you reside in or near these proposed districts, you have likely received a notice about this upcoming public hearing.

Understanding Industrial Development Districts

Establishing an Industrial Development District marks the initial step towards obtaining an Industrial Facilities Tax Abatement certification for eligible businesses engaged in property improvements. Governed by Public Act 198 of 1974, this initiative has proven instrumental in facilitating up to a 50% tax abatement on capital projects and expansions, thereby generating numerous job opportunities within our city.

Four Misconceptions about IDD

- » An IDD does not equate to rezoning; your residential status remains unaffected.
- » Your property value for taxation remains unaffected by the district. Market fluctuations are driven by various factors such as inflation, property conditions, neighboring uses, and local supply.
- » The IDD initiative is unrelated to regulatory takings or eminent domain. Residential and commercial properties within an IDD maintain their existing status.
- » Merely residing in an IDD does not grant individuals an Industrial Facilities Tax Abatement. The certification is exclusively available for qualifying businesses engaged in construction, renovation, or expansion, subject to city and state-level approvals.

Why is City Proposing the Six New IDD?

Over time, the city has established 94 separate IDDs, each requiring businesses to navigate a complicated approval process. The proposed consolidation aims to expedite the construction process for qualifying applicants, allowing them to concurrently apply for tax abatement certification. This not only reduces community workload but also accelerates economic development.

The City Administration cannot predict specific industrial development requests but anticipates that future projects will predominantly align with the six proposed IDDs. The comprehensive coverage of zoning and land use areas in these districts accommodates a wide array of qualifying business types, as outlined in the City of Portage 2014 Comprehensive Plan.

The City of Portage has successfully used bidnet since 2021 as our e-procurement solution. bidnet facilitates paperless transactions, saving time and resources for both vendors and the city.

Cost Savings: Elimination of paper usage saves money for vendors and the city.

Virtual Participation: Bids and solicitations can be opened and viewed via video conferencing, allowing virtual attendance from anywhere.

Timely Notifications: Vendors receive simultaneous notifications of changes or answers to questions via bidnet.

Renew Your Dog's License Online

Did you know that you can renew your dog's license online? Visit the Kalamazoo County Animal Services and Enforcement (KCASE) portal at kalcounty.com/ac to update your contact information, submit proof of sterilization and updated rabies certificates, upload a photo of your pet, and purchase a license.



As a convenience for Portage dog owners, the City of Portage Treasurer's Office will continue to issue dog licenses now through March 1, 2024.

- » \$15 for dogs that are spayed/neutered or less than one year old
- » \$45 for dogs not spayed/neutered and more than one year old

To **renew** a license, present your pre-printed renewal form issued by KCASE (and a current rabies vaccination certificate if it indicates an expiration date on the renewal form). To purchase a **new** license, present the current rabies vaccination certificate and proof of spaying/neutering from your veterinarian. A receipt of vaccination is not valid proof of rabies vaccination; you must present a vaccination certificate.

Payment options at the Treasury window include cash, check (payable to "City of Portage"), and credit/debit card (fees apply).

The Treasury window is open Monday through Thursday from 7:30 AM to 5:30 PM and Friday from 8 AM to 12 PM (excluding holidays). If you have questions related to dog licenses, please call KCASE at 383-8775.

Michigan's Presidential Primary Election Moving in 2024

With the passage of Public Act 2 of 2023, Michigan Election Law was amended by the State Legislature to move Michigan's Presidential Primary Election to the fourth Tuesday in February each presidential election year going forward. The 2024 Presidential Primary Election will be held on **Tuesday, February 27, 2024**. Michigan now joins Nevada and South Carolina in holding primaries in the second month of the 2024 presidential election year. All 19 precincts in the City of Portage will be open on Election Day from 7 AM to 8 PM. To find out where you vote in-person on Election Day, visit the Michigan Voter Information Center at mi.gov/vote.

Presidential Primary Election Ballot Type Selection

Whether you plan to vote absentee, vote early, or vote in person at your precinct on Election Day, the law requires that voters select a specific ballot type for the Presidential Primary Election: Democrat or Republican. There is NO non-partisan style ballot for 2024. Neither the State of Michigan nor the City of Portage track party registration but, due to the semi-closed nature of the Presidential Primary, ballots are party-specific. Voters on the Permanent Absentee Application List AND the Permanent Absentee Ballot List will

receive a form in the mail to select their preferred ballot type for the Primary. Absentee Voters can also complete their application and ballot type online at mi.gov/vote.

New Ballot Drop Boxes and Locations

The Portage City Clerk's Office will be introducing measures to meet the new requirements of Proposal 22-2 including the installation of additional Official Absentee Voter Drop Boxes around the city. Two new drop boxes in addition to the three secure drop boxes located at Portage City Hall, have been installed.

Official Absentee Voter Drop Box Locations:

- » Portage Fire Station No. 2 (6101 Oakland Drive)
 - Near the red emergency phone
- » Portage Fire Station No. 3 (8503 South Sprinkle Road)
 - Near the red emergency phone
- » Portage City Hall (7900 South Westnedge Avenue)
 - Just outside the front door
 - East side of the parking lot
 - 24-hour Treasury drop box



All locations are on or near a Metro bus line. The drop boxes are available 24/7 and are monitored by video camera, in accordance with Michigan Election Law.

Early Voting coming to Kalamazoo County

Following the passage of Proposal 22-2 in November 2022, Michigan is now one of 21 states to offer in-person early voting for state and federal elections. Early voting will be implemented statewide for the Presidential Primary in 2024. Early voting is different than in-person absentee voting in that voters can enter their ballot into a tabulator rather than it being held until Election Day. Results are not generated until the polls close on Election Day.

Over the past year, city and township clerks across Kalamazoo County have worked with the County Clerk to

create a collaborative Early Voting Agreement, which the Portage City Council unanimously supported in October 2023. Voters will have nine consecutive days of early voting, beginning two Saturdays before Election Day and ending the Sunday before Election Day.

Four early voting sites have been selected throughout Kalamazoo County, all of which can accommodate voters from any participating jurisdiction, including Portage. Each site will be open from 9 AM to 5 PM for the nine days of early voting.

- » Douglass Community Center: 1000 West Paterson Street, Kalamazoo
- » Kalamazoo County Expo Center: 2900 Lake Street, Kalamazoo
- » Portage Parks & Recreation: 320 Library Lane, Portage

Early voting is only available during state and federal elections. In 2024, Early Voting Centers will be open for the Presidential Primary in February (February 17 to 25), the State Primary in August, and the General Election in November. Early voting will not be available for local or special elections. As always, voters still have the option to vote at their local precinct on Election Day or via absentee ballot.
