Coming Soon! A New Way To Recycle Food Scraps



The City of Portage is partnering with My Green Michigan to debut a Food Scraps Recycling Pilot* Program, **beginning the week of January 6, 2025.** The program, provided to Portage citizens at no additional fee, is tailored to turn food scraps into rich, nutrient-dense soil for the environment. Diverting food waste to composting has additional benefits, including reducing pollution and landfill waste, as well as lowering methane emissions. This pilot program is a part of the city's continuous efforts toward sustainability.

Citizens can easily recycle food scraps using a container at home that fits your needs, such as a lidded bowl, compostable bag, plastic container, countertop bin, or 5-gallon bucket. Simply visit one of the ten convenient drop-off sites on your schedule and deposit your scraps into the 64-gallon lime green bins provided.

My Green Michigan will empty the collection bins every other

Curbside Recycling in Portage

The City of Portage continues its commitment to the conservation of natural resources and minimizing the strain on the planet. Since January 2024, the city's Curbside Recycling Program has collected and recycled **more than 2000 TONS of materials**. Picture a parking lot filled with more than 1,300 cars – that's how much waste you've diverted from a landfill!

If you're already participating, **thank you for making a difference!** Not recycling yet? Keep reading to discover how you can join the effort and help keep Portage clean and green.



Through a voter-approved millage, the City of Portage proudly offers the Curbside Recycling Program, making it easy and convenient for residents to recycle right at their curb. This program is made possible through a partnership with Best Way Disposal, ensuring efficient and reliable collection of recyclable materials.

Single-Stream Recycling

Mix all accepted recyclable items in a single container. Simply place all of your clean recyclables in the cart together. Be mindful that depositing soiled materials into

the cart can contaminate an entire load of clean recyclable items; compliance with these preparation instructions is essential to the success of the program. The automated recycling collection and sorting process includes GPS capabilities and video detection equipment.

Enroll In the Program

To participate in the Curbside Recycling Program (new service only), please complete and submit the sign-up form at portagemi.gov/284. Residents have a choice of a 96-gallon or 64-gallon wheeled cart. The cart is easy to maneuver to the curb and prevents recyclable materials from being blown around on windy days. Existing participants may order additional carts (fee applies) or a different size cart by calling Best Way Disposal at 388-3300.



Visit portagemi.gov/284 to learn what materials are recyclable and how to prepare those materials.

Biweekly Collection

Recycling is collected every two weeks - visit portagemi.gov/284 to learn your collection day. The wheeled carts provide

adequate space for two weeks' worth of recyclable materials, which means fewer trucks through your neighborhood. More importantly, the collection of materials once every two weeks results in a decrease in fuel consumption and emissions and the wear and tear on city streets.

Wheel the cart to the street by 6 AM on your collection day; position the cart facing toward the street with a 3-foot clearance from other objects (other carts, mailbox, vehicle).

Drop-Off Recycling

Portage residents may also utilize the Best Way Disposal drop-off facility for a fee of \$5 per cubic yard. All items included in the Curbside Recycling Program are accepted at the drop-off facility located at:

City of Portage Snow Removal Program: What You Need to Know

As winter arrives, the City of Portage works diligently to ensure our streets are safe and passable, no matter how severe the snowfall. With 221 miles of city streets to cover, snow removal crews are out as early as 3:30 AM to begin plowing, sanding, and salting.



How Snow Removal Works

To make the most of city resources and provide maximum benefit to drivers, snow removal is prioritized by traffic levels on city streets:

- Priority I:** Major streets (e.g., South Westnedge Avenue, Oakland Drive, Milham Avenue, Kilgore Road, Shaver Road, Lovers Lane, etc.)
- Priority II:** Feeder streets leading into neighborhoods and roads providing access to schools.
- Priority III:** Interior residential streets.
- Priority IV:** Cul-de-sacs and dead-end streets.

During a snowstorm, the focus remains on keeping Priority I and II streets clear, usually completed within 4 to 8 hours. Once those roads are safe, crews move to Priority III and IV streets, which can take up to 48 hours depending on conditions. Bridges, hills, intersections, and curves also receive extra attention throughout a storm to ensure safe passage.

How You Can Help

Residents play an important role in making snow removal as efficient as possible. Please keep the following city ordinances and state laws in mind:

- Basketball Hoops:** Basketball stands are not permitted in the city right-of-way.
- Street Parking:** From December 1 to March 15, parking is prohibited on city streets between 2 AM and 6 AM (see article below).
- Trash and Recycling:** On collection days, keep bins on the curb and out of the roadway.
- Snow Removal from Private Property:** It is illegal to push snow from driveways, sidewalks, or parking lots onto public streets.

A Proactive Approach to Snow Removal

Before a snowstorm hits, crews may apply a liquid calcium chloride solution to roadways to prevent snow and ice from bonding to the pavement. This pretreatment makes snow removal faster and more efficient. However, not all storms are suitable for this technique. The Department of Public Works evaluates factors like air and pavement temperatures, humidity, and precipitation rates to determine when pretreatment is appropriate.

Track Snowplows in Real-Time



SnowPaths is an app that allows users to view the real-time locations of active snowplows deployed during a snow event. The app utilizes Automated Vehicle Location (AVL), Geographic Positioning System (GPS) and Geographic Information System (GIS) technologies to visually display the snowplow’s location. The app also displays the status of plowed city roads on an interactive map. SnowPaths can be accessed at portagemi.gov/290 and on the MI.Portage app (available in the App Store & Google Play).

Overnight On-Street Parking Ordinance

Portage residents are asked to abide by the city ordinance that prohibits overnight, on-street parking between the hours of 2 AM and 6 AM from December 1 to March 15. Observance of this city ordinance allows snowplow operators to safely and efficiently clear city streets of snow. In addition, clear streets promote crime deterrence and offer the police department better visibility while conducting neighborhood patrols.



Vehicle owners who do not comply with this local ordinance may be cited by the Portage Department of Public Safety. Residents and visitors are also reminded that during heavy snow events, snowplows may be out clearing streets during daytime hours as well. Limiting on-street parking during these weather events will expedite the snow removal process.

Time to Upgrade to Better Service at No Extra Cost!

In recent years, Portage neighborhoods have seen an influx of small yard flags marking underground utilities. These flags signal the installation of new fiber optic lines that promise faster (and hopefully more affordable) internet for all. Alongside this, however, outdated infrastructure has lingered: those familiar, boxy pedestals housing “twisted pairs” of copper lines that provided telephone service for decades. Residents are eager to see the construction completed and the unsightly pedestals removed.



The good news? If you’re an AT&T customer, you can help speed up the process by upgrading your service. If you’re still receiving internet or telephone service from AT&T through old copper lines, consider switching to AT&T’s fiber network. AT&T owns both the copper pedestals and much of the new fiber and is reaching out to customers to facilitate a no-cost upgrade. Not only is the fiber connection faster and more reliable, but AT&T confirms that generally it won’t cost more than your current plan.

To upgrade, visit att.com/fiberupgrade41, call (866) 215-9510, or stop by the AT&T store at 5901 South Westnedge Avenue. The more residents who make the switch, the sooner we can remove those old pedestals and restore our lawns. Enjoy improved service and a cleaner neighborhood – upgrade today!

January Curbside Brush Collection

The January Curbside Brush Collection includes whole Christmas trees (free of tinsel and ornaments).

The Quarterly Curbside Brush Collection will begin on Monday, January 6. To ensure the collection of your items, residents are asked to have brush and Christmas trees placed at the curb by 7 AM on the Monday of your designated collection week (see map). Each street will be cleared one time, and each zone will be cleared within its designated week. Crews cannot return to pick up items placed out late. If snowfall occurs, residents are asked to clear snow from brush piles and Christmas trees to ensure crews are able to find items for collection.

Leaf and Brush Drop Off Days

February 1, 2025, 9 AM - 1 PM

The City of Portage Compost Facility will be open for residents to drop off brush, leaves, and whole Christmas trees (free of decorations and tinsel) from 9 AM to 1 PM on Saturday, February 1. The compost facility is located at 10905 Oakland Drive, just south of West Osterhout Avenue. Department of Public Works staff will be present to direct patrons to the proper locations to drop brush, leaves, and Christmas trees.

Stay Safe This Holiday Season With These Fire Safety Tips

The holiday season is a time of joy, cherished moments, and celebrations with loved ones. To ensure your festivities remain safe and worry-free, the Portage Department of Public Safety shares important fire safety tips to protect you and your family during this special time of year. “Safety is the best gift we can give ourselves and our loved ones this season,” said Deputy Fire Marshal Graham.

General Holiday Safety

- » Choose flame-resistant decorations and keep them away from heat sources like fireplaces or heaters.
- » Secure holiday lights with clips instead of nails to avoid damaging cords and reducing fire risks.
- » Keep matches and lighters out of reach of children. Never leave candles unattended and ensure they are placed far from flammable decorations.

Lithium-Ion Battery Safety

- » Use only manufacturer-approved chargers and batteries for devices to prevent overheating.
- » Avoid charging devices on flammable surfaces, such as beds or couches, and never overcharge.



- » Store batteries at room temperature. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F or above 105°F.
- » If a battery shows signs of overheating, smoke, or odors, stop using it immediately. Move the device away from flammable materials, and call 9-1-1 if necessary.

Christmas Tree Safety

- » If choosing a live tree, select a fresh tree with green needles that don’t easily fall off when touched.
- » Place your tree at least three feet away from heat sources, including fireplaces, radiators, and candles. Ensure it doesn’t block exits.
- » Trim the tree trunk by two inches before placing it in the stand to enhance water absorption and replenish the water daily to keep the tree hydrated.
- » Inspect holiday lights for damage before use and follow the manufacturer’s recommendations for how many strands can be safely connected. Always turn off lights before bed or when leaving home.

Proper Tree Disposal

A dry tree can quickly become a fire hazard. Dispose of your tree promptly after the holidays during the January Curbside Brush Collection (see article to the left). Bringing in outdoor lights after the season can also prevent electrical hazards and keep your decorations in good shape for next year.

“The holiday spirit shines brightest when everyone stays safe,” said Assistant Fire Chief Jed Wild. “From all of us at the Portage Department of Public Safety, we wish you a safe, festive, and peaceful holiday season!”

2024 Winter Property Taxes

On November 27, the 2024 winter tax bills for the City of Portage were mailed. Payments will be accepted starting Monday, December 2, 2024 and are due by 5 PM on Friday, February 14, 2025.

Property owners should call the Treasury Office at 329-4455 if you don't receive a winter tax bill by December 6, 2024. Failure to receive a tax bill does not relieve the you of the responsibility for payment of the tax and applicable fees. To quickly access your property tax information and pay online, scan the QR code located on the front of your bill or visit portagemi.gov. Property tax information is updated daily.

Payment Options

USPS Mail: Mail your payment to the City of Portage Treasury Office, 7900 South Westnedge Avenue, Portage, MI 49002-5117. Please include your payment and the bottom portion of your tax statement. Payment by check authorizes the city to convert the check to an electronic funds transfer and your bank account may be debited as soon as the same day the city receives the check payment. To avoid a 3% late fee, **mailed payments must be postmarked by the U.S. Post Office on or before February 14, 2025**, and received by the city no later than February 21, 2025. In all late payment disputes, the Portage Treasury Office will rely on the postmark applied by the Postmaster (metered postmarks are not accepted).

Drop Box: A 24-hour drop box is located at the south "Exit Only" door of City Hall at 7900 South Westnedge Avenue, Portage, MI 49002. Look for the "Night Drop Box" sign near the curb. Include the bottom portion of your tax statement with your payment. Payments deposited after 7:30 AM



may be processed on the same business day. Payments deposited after 5:30 PM or on weekends are processed on the next business day.

Online or Phone Payments: Pay online with a credit/debit card (3% fee, \$2.95 minimum) or E-check payment (\$2.50 fee). Visit portagemi.gov and click on the Bill Pay icon. Phone payments can be made by calling (844) 943-3997 (3% + \$.075 fee).

Auto Pay: Visit portagemi.gov and click the "Bill Pay" icon on the home page to set up auto payment of your recurring tax bill. Select "Register" or "Pay Current Taxes" and register your account. Then go to *My Profile > Payment Methods > Add new credit/debit card* OR *Add new bank*. Once you have entered and confirmed your information, select "set up auto-pay." Payment will be debited from your account on the tax due date. A 3% fee, \$2.95 minimum applies when using a credit/debit card; **no fee when using a checking or savings account**.

Online Banking: Pay through your financial institution's online bill pay. First, contact your bank to confirm that they honor tax payments through their system. Use your parcel number as your account number. Online banking payments should be scheduled no later than February 4, 2025, to ensure timely delivery of funds to the City of Portage to avoid late fees.

In Person at City Hall: Visit the Treasury Office located at Portage City Hall, 7900 South Westnedge Avenue. The Treasury Office is open Monday to Thursday, 7:30 AM to 5:30 PM, Friday, 8 AM to 12 PM. City Hall will be closed:

» Tuesday, December 24 » Wednesday, January 1
» Wednesday, December 25 » Monday, January 20

All 2024 property taxes that remain unpaid on March 1, 2025, will be turned over to the Kalamazoo County Treasurer for collection where additional fees will be added.
