A Message from Mayor Patricia M. Randall

The month of January starts with a holiday celebrated around the world. Fireworks, popping corks and celebrations center on the hope of good things to come. As we flip the calendar, the symbolic act of ending one year and starting another offers everyone a fresh start.

Many use this month to set personal goals to become healthier and to better themselves. Common resolutions include losing weight, getting more exercise and sleep, saving money by spending less, becoming more organized and sharing more quality time with family. We all want to make the most of our lives and the coming year.

Your City Council also sets goals. We strive to continue to deliver the high level of services you expect and deserve while responding to the changing needs of our community. The wheels of government turn slowly, so many of the New Year's goals have rolled forward from the last.

Housing continues to be a priority for both our country and our community. Your City Council is working hard to maintain what we already have, as well as to responsibly construct new units at all price points. Newly approved developments

include Stanwood Crossings, McConley Cove, Oakland Farm, Oakland Crossings and River Caddis. Combined, these projects will offer 321 new housing units. They range in scope from apartments to senior living and even single family homes. Each will sell at fair market value with subsidies available for those meeting the criteria for eligibility.

Plans for the Portage Farmers Market are well underway. The permanent location will surround the Portage Zhang Senior Center. There will be stalls for 50 vendors, eight food trucks and an entertainment area. To preserve your tax dollars, we are not duplicating costly amenities: restrooms and parking already in place at the Portage Zhang Senior Center will be open and made available to visitors to the Farmers Market. The local architect who designed the Senior Center is creating this complementary structure for the summer market, which will also be available year-round for public events.

Revitalization within the Lake Center District is moving forward fueled by an \$11 million investment. This project will improve safety for motorized and non-motorized traffic and support area businesses. This year we will focus on installing a new four-way traffic signal at Forest and Portage Road while making improvements to the Lakeview Park boardwalk. We have also launched a Façade Improvement Program to encourage small businesses along this corridor to invest in their streetscape.

Of course, The Crossroads mall remains a priority despite the fact that it is privately owned. The fourteen acres that housed Sears was sold to Zap Zone last September. That new recreational facility will occupy the entire space. We're continuing to monitor compliance with zoning regulations in this area to encourage future redevelopment.

New in 2025 is the renewal of the street millage originally approved in 2006. This spreads the cost of maintenance and improvements by shifting the financial burden from just individual property owners to everyone. This system has worked well as we continue to pave, chip seal, mill and fill miles of local streets each and every year.

Our system of parks and trails continues to be enjoyed by both residents and non-residents alike. We continue to explore extending our trails to connect area businesses to neighboring communities. As we monitor our parks' usage and offerings, we recognize and acknowledge the potential need for additional pickle ball courts. As trends continue to shift from commercial retail as a destination, we are researching the benefits of embracing recreation-based tourism.

It will be a busy and productive year for our city. Now, as to my personal goals...

Portage Road 360

The Portage Road 360 Plan is a comprehensive planning and engineering process focused on celebrating the businesses, neighborhoods, and public spaces along Portage Road. Our goal is to create a safe, walkable, and thriving corridor that offers multiple transportation options for residents and visitors alike.



Isn't there already a plan in place?

Yes! The Lake Center District Corridor and Placemaking Plan, completed in 2021, laid the foundation for improvements, such as adding a traffic signal at Forest Drive, enhancing Lakeview Park, and rezoning the area to encourage a mix of uses. While many of these recommendations are being implemented, creating a truly multi-modal and walkable corridor requires

additional community input to refine the design and focus on roadway improvements. This phase will specifically explore opportunities for transforming the roadway area.

What will we discuss?

A design team has been hired to collaborate with the community to shape a unified vision for Portage Road, spanning from East Osterhout Avenue to East Centre Avenue. Your input is vital! We want to know what works, what doesn't, and how we can make this corridor a destination people want to travel to and within – not just pass through.

How can I get involved?

We need your ideas! Participate in a community event, complete our survey, visit a pop-up event, or join a focus group. Over the next six months, there will be plenty of opportunities to share your input. Remember, we aren't mind readers – if you don't participate, your amazing ideas won't be heard!

City to Launch Update to Zoning and Development Regulations

The City of Portage is embarking on a major initiative to modernize zoning, subdivision, and condominium development codes. Over the next 18 months, the city will work to consolidate and streamline regulations into a Unified Development Code (UDC). This update will create a cohesive framework to guide growth and development in Portage for years to come.

The UDC aims to implement key recommendations from the recently adopted Portage Forward Together 2045 Master Plan. Approved by the Planning Commission in August 2024 following an extensive community engagement process, the Master Plan reflects input from scores of residents and sets the vision for Portage's growth over the next two decades.

This ambitious project will address the challenges posed by the city's current patchwork of development ordinances, some of which date back to the 1960s. The new code will help:

» Preserve neighborhood character while enabling

thoughtful redevelopment.

- » Expand housing options, including attainable choices like duplexes and town homes.
- » Remove barriers to redevelopment and promote vibrant mixed-use developments in key commercial areas.

Kickoff Events and Community Involvement

The city is partnering with Kendig Keast Collaborative (KKC), a nationally recognized planning and zoning consulting firm, to lead the UDC update. From January 7 to January 10, the KKC team will host a series of events to introduce the process and gather input:

- » City Council Kickoff Presentation: January 7 at 6 PM, City Hall Council Chambers.
- » Planning Commission Overview: January 8 at 6 PM, City Hall Council Chambers.

KKC will also meet with the city's Community Development team, who will oversee the project, as well as key stakeholders familiar with Portage's current regulations.

City of Portage Prioritizes Housing-Focused Programs in 2025

The City of Portage is continuing its commitment to housing-focused initiatives in 2025. The Human Services Board is reviewing 31 program applications from 20 agencies, with \$216,000 in funding recommendations expected to go to City Council soon.

Planning for the 2025-26 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program is also underway, with \$300,000 in anticipated funding. These funds will support critical programs like home repairs for low-to-moderate-income homeowners, neighborhood improvements, and transportation assistance through the Portage Community Center.


The city is preparing its final Annual Action Plan under the current Consolidated Plan and invites public participation in drafting a new five-year plan. Investment in the Portage Community Remains Strong

Location, location, location. An often-used cliché, but one that speaks volumes to investors, developers, and the construction industry. The strength of a community can be captured by the opportunities it provides for growth and investment. Portage continues this trend with positive new residential, commercial and industrial reinvestment and development.

Construction activity associated with new and expanding residential, commercial and industrial growth not only identifies a strong economy, but also that of a strong community. Construction activity continues to reinforce economic investment in Portage since FY 2015-16. Between FY 2015-16 and FY 2023-24, construction value averaged over \$96.6 million per year. In 2017-18, the \$157.6 million construction valuation recorded was a record for Portage. Through the first six months of FY 2024-25, over \$42.6 million of new community investment has already occurred.

With a fundamental understanding of common objectives, Portage remains a leading destination for businesses and families to call home. The city's leadership strives to ensure that the values and goals of the community are successful through civic visioning, long-term planning and implementation direction. Continued large scale construction investment by several entities affirm the continued confidence in the area and its citizens. In turn, these



investments provide for enhanced local employment, diverse housing choices, and a variety of restaurants, retail establishments and recreation facilities that Portage residents have come to appreciate.

Community Risk Reduction

Making Portage Safer for Everyone

Every 23 seconds, a fire department in the United States responds to a fire. Fires claim thousands of lives, cause life-altering injuries, and result in billions of dollars in property damage each year. In 2023, fires led to 3,670 civilian deaths and 13,350 civilian injuries, with nearly 80% of these tragedies occurring in homes.

But fire emergencies aren't the only risks facing communities. Medical emergencies now account for over 80% of fire department call volumes in many areas, and wild land/urban interface (WUI) fires are an escalating threat, causing multibillion-dollar losses nationwide.

To tackle these growing challenges, fire departments – including the Portage Department of Public Safety – are embracing Community Risk Reduction (CRR) programs. CRR is a proactive, data-driven approach that identifies and addresses local risks through strategic resource investments. At its heart, CRR seeks to prevent emergencies before they happen, focusing on five key strategies known as the Five E's:

Education • Engineering • Enforcement • Emergency Response • Economic Incentive

By targeting these areas, we aim to reduce the frequency and impact of emergencies, from fires to medical incidents, to make Portage a safer place for all.

CRR Accomplishments This Year

This year, the Portage Department of Public Safety achieved remarkable milestones in Community Risk Reduction:

- » **School Fire Safety Programs:** Educated over 3,700 elementary students with age-appropriate fire safety lessons, teaching them how to stay safe and respond during emergencies.
- » **Smoke Alarm Installations:** Partnered with Michigan's MI Prevention program to install free smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in high-risk Portage homes.
- » **Senior Safety Initiatives:** Conducted disaster preparedness workshops for older adults, providing emergency kits and resources to help them plan for severe weather and other risks.
- » **Pedestrian Safety Campaigns:** Promoted visibility efforts



to ensure safe routes to school, reducing risks for students walking and biking.

» **Public Education Events:** Hosted the F.I.R.E. Open House, where families learned about fire prevention, emergency response, and careers in firefighting.

These accomplishments were made possible thanks to the unwavering support of our community and partners who share our vision for a safer Portage.

CRR goes beyond fire safety – it's about addressing the unique risks that threaten our community. From educating children about fire prevention to equipping older adults for emergencies, CRR helps us proactively safeguard lives and property.

Throughout January, the Portage Department of Public Safety will spotlight CRR initiatives on social media, sharing valuable resources and tips for home safety and emergency preparedness. Each week, we'll highlight a different element of CRR to empower residents to take small, proactive steps to reduce risks in their homes and neighborhoods.

Turning Scraps Into Sustainability

The City of Portage, in partnership with My Green Michigan, is excited to announce the Food Scraps Recycling Program! Designed to convert your food scraps into nutrient-rich compost, this program is a win for the environment and the community.



When you participate, your food scraps are collected and taken to a composting facility where they undergo a natural decomposition process. Over time, microbes break down the organic material, transforming it into dark, crumbly compost that enriches soil, supports plant growth, and reduces the need for chemical fertilizers. By recycling food scraps, you're not only creating a valuable resource but also helping reduce pollution, landfill waste, and methane emissions.

Collect your food scraps in a container that works for your home – a lidded bowl, compostable bag, countertop bin, or even a 5-gallon bucket. When you're ready, drop off your scraps at one of ten conveniently located lime-green bins throughout the

city. My Green Michigan collects the scraps every other Tuesday, turning your waste into valuable compost.



Changes to the Absentee Voter Application Process

Michigan voters now have the option to request absentee ballots for all future elections with a single request, thanks to Proposal 22-2, passed in November 2022. This eliminates the need for the previous "Permanent Absentee Voter Application List," which allowed voters to receive absentee ballot applications before every election.

Starting January 1, 2025, the Portage Office of the City Clerk will no longer mail absentee ballot applications for each election. However, voters can still apply for absentee ballots for individual elections as needed.

2025 Dog License Renewal

In-Person License Purchases

For those who prefer to handle renewals in person, the City of Portage Treasury Office (7900 S. Westnedge Ave) will continue to sell dog licenses. Please note that City of Portage staff can assist with processing license sales but cannot answer detailed questions about the licenses. For specific inquiries, contact Kalamazoo County Animal Services & Enforcement (KCASE) at 269-383-8775.

Fees for dog licenses (set by Kalamazoo County Animal Control):

- » \$16 for spayed/neutered dogs or dogs under one year old
- » \$46 for dogs that are not spayed/neutered and over one year old

To renew your dog's license:

- » Bring your pre-printed renewal form from Kalamazoo County Animal Control.
- » Provide a current rabies vaccination certificate (vaccination receipts are not valid).

For first-time licenses, bring:

- » A current rabies vaccination certificate
- » Proof of spaying/neutering from your veterinarian
- » Payment Options

- » Cash
- » Check (payable to the City of Portage, subject to electronic funds transfer)
- » Credit/debit card (with a 3% convenience fee, minimum \$2.95, charged by Invoice Cloud)


