Aging, while watching those around you do so, is another challenge awaiting all of us. We all want to age in place with grace and dignity. We all crave our independence and want to keep it. Our reliance on the ability to drive, is life changing when the keys are best set aside or taken by a loved one.

The Portage Zhang Senior Center is a true testament that

our community embraces the aging population. We built it and they came! The incredible surge in enrollment from 1,350 in 2022 to 4,262 today makes it official: The City of Portage is an Age-Friendly Community. Our center offers a wide array of programming and is now 80% self funding through membership and class fees and our popular travel program. To have this center cover most of the costs of operation has been a huge financial gift to our city.

As we strive to recognize the ever-changing needs of our community, it became important to support those with diminishing memory and support their care givers. As we recognized this need, we wanted to be a welcoming space for the individuals with memory loss and their care providers to connect, share experiences and enjoy activities that support cognitive health through education and awareness. New to our offerings is a Memory Café which meets monthly to provide a safe and supportive environment for participants to bond with others facing similar challenges. Skilled staff and dedicated volunteers

provide activities to encourage socialization to reduce feelings of isolation.

The entire city staff have participated in the training to help recognize and assist people with memory loss. It is our goal to offer this training to area businesses and their employees to help serve our aging population. To address seniors unable to drive, we offer transportation for members living in the Portage city limits who wish to participate in the many offerings at our facility. This free service is only offered with the assistance of willing volunteers drivers. Please help us meet this need by volunteering.

As one becomes more attuned to those around them, it's not uncommon to see a person struggling to help a senior get in or out of a car; a senior holding a doll on a plane, or someone struggling to place an order at a fast-food restaurant's kiosk. Patience is required to navigate the realization that one day this could happen to one of our parents...or ourself.

## Portage Millage Rate Ranks Low Among Similar-Sized Michigan Cities

The City of Portage millage rate of 10.6400 is a reflection of the City Council's commitment to providing quality public services to its citizens at one of the lowest rates in Michigan. The millage rate is the amount per \$1,000 of taxable value used to calculate local property taxes. The millage rate is multiplied by the total taxable value of the property then divided by \$1,000 in order to arrive at the total value of city property taxes. The owner of a home in Portage with a taxable value


of \$100,000 would pay \$1,064 in property taxes to the City of Portage. (School, county, and state taxes are levied separately and added to this amount.)

As shown in the graph below, Portage ranks third lowest among Michigan cities with a population between 30,000 and 70,000 in terms of millage rate. Municipalities that also levy income taxes (denoted with an asterisk) typically don't need to raise as much in property taxes and often have lower millage rates.

A low city millage rate is not only attractive to potential home buyers, it also encourages companies and manufacturers to build new plants or expand or renovate existing facilities, creating jobs, and providing investment in the community. This competitive advantage continues to attract business development, investors, and residents to Portage.

## Portage Launches Plastic Bag Recycling Initiative

Portage residents now have a new way to recycle plastic bags and film thanks to a collaborative effort between the Portage Environmental Board and the Portage Youth Advisory Committee (YAC). This initiative, which aims to reduce plastic waste by providing convenient drop-off locations, is part of a one-year Recycling Challenge with NexTrex ([nextrrex.com](http://nextrrex.com)).

### How to Participate

Residents can bring their plastic bags and film to a designated collection bin inside Portage City Hall during normal business hours:

- » Monday - Thursday: 7:30 AM - 5:30 PM
- » Friday: 8 AM - 12 PM

Additionally, students at Portage Northern and Portage Central High Schools can contribute through collection bins at their schools, with their environmental clubs actively gathering plastic bags to support the initiative.

### What Can Be Recycled?

- » Grocery bags
- » Retail/department store bags
- » Bread bags
- » Produce bags
- » Plastic outer wrap (from water bottles, paper towels, etc.)
- » Resealable food bags (clean and dry)
- » Bubble wrap and air pillows (popped)
- » Newspaper sleeves
- » Dry cleaning bags
- » Cereal and cracker box liners



All materials should be clean, dry, and free of food residue before being dropped off.

# Portage Road 360: What's Next?

## Construction on Portage Road

In the second half of 2025, a new traffic signal will be installed at the intersection of Portage Road and Forest Drive. The first phase of Portage Road 360 construction would not start until 2026 and is expected to stretch from near Bacon Avenue to Lakeview Drive. The timing of future phases would be subject to funding availability.

## Meet the Community Engagement & Resolution Team – CERT

The Portage Department of Public Safety (PDPS) Community Engagement and Resolution Team (CERT) is committed to building strong relationships throughout Portage and enhancing public safety using innovative, non-traditional policing methods. Through crime prevention, education, and targeted enforcement efforts, CERT works to reduce crime and improve the quality of life for residents and visitors. The team also assists patrol officers and the Detective Bureau in addressing chronic criminal activity.

## Neighborhood Engagement & Crime Prevention

Portage is home to many thriving neighborhoods, and CERT officers play a crucial role in keeping them safe. Each officer is assigned a specific crime prevention district, where they establish and maintain relationships with community leaders, neighborhood watch organizations, apartment complex and mobile home park management, and condominium associations.

## Targeted Enforcement

CERT is responsible for addressing persistent issues that impact public safety and quality of life through focused enforcement activities, including:

- » Speeding & traffic enforcement
- » Property crime patrols
- » Retail theft prevention
- » Surveillance for suspicious/drug activity
- » Alcohol, tobacco, and vaping compliance checks

## Programs & Services

### Community Training

CERT is dedicated to educating residents on crime prevention and emergency preparedness. The team offers presentations on various topics, including:

- » CRASE (Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events)
- » Child passenger car seat installation & safety
- » Cyber fraud and internet scams
- » Mental Health Services

In partnership with Integrated Services of Kalamazoo (ISK), CERT provides emergency mental health support and crisis follow-up welfare checks. A dedicated ISK social worker joins CERT officers on patrol, offering specialized assistance during crises where mental health expertise is essential.

### Private Security Camera Registration

Residents and businesses with security cameras can register their locations with the Portage Department of Public Safety (PDPS). This voluntary program allows investigators to quickly identify nearby cameras that may have captured evidence of a crime or disturbance. Registration does not

grant automatic access to footage – PDPS will contact registered participants if a review is needed, and camera owners retain the right to decline any request. To register your security camera, visit [portagemi.gov/345](http://portagemi.gov/345).

### Community Engagement & Outreach

CERT actively fosters positive connections throughout Portage by organizing, hosting, and participating in a variety of community events, including:

- » Coffee with a Cop – Informal meet-and-greet events at local venues
- » Pig Out with Public Safety – A back-to-school event where students meet School Resource Officers and receive backpacks filled with supplies
- » Safety Presentations – Engaging sessions tailored for older adults, scouting troops, youth organizations, and individuals with special needs
- » Block Parties & National Night Out – Strengthening community ties through neighborhood gatherings
- » School & Summer Camp Visits – Interacting with students to promote safety awareness
- » Safety Meetings – Collaborations with apartment complex managers on security strategies
- » Retail Loss Prevention Meetings – Partnering with local businesses to prevent theft and fraud

## Spring Forward & Stay Safe

### Test and Replace Smoke Alarm Batteries

As we prepare to spring forward on Sunday, March 9, and set our clocks ahead for Daylight Saving Time, the Portage Department of Public Safety – Fire Division urges residents to take a moment to test and replace smoke alarm batteries. This simple habit could save lives.



## The Reality of Home Fires

Home fires remain a significant threat in the United States. According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA):

- » A home structure fire is reported every 95 seconds.
- » One civilian fire-related injury occurs every 52 minutes.
- » One home fire-related death occurs every three hours.

In 2023 alone, there were nearly 1.4 million fires, resulting in:

- » 3,670 civilian deaths
- » 13,350 injuries

While fire-related deaths have decreased by 43 percent since 1980, recent years have seen an increase in home fire fatalities, with a rate of 8.7 deaths per 1,000 home fires in 2023, which is 22 percent higher than in 1980.

Most fatal fires occur in:

- » One- and two-family homes (67.8 percent of fire deaths).
- » Apartment buildings (10.9 percent of fire deaths).

## Know Your Smoke Alarm

Smoke alarms are the first line of defense in a fire—but only if they work. Here's what you need to know:

- » 10-Year Non-Replaceable Battery Alarms – Designed to last up to 10 years. If the alarm chirps, signaling a low battery, replace the entire unit immediately.
- » Replaceable Battery Alarms – These alarms need a fresh battery at least once a year. If the alarm chirps, replace the battery right away.
- » Follow Manufacturer Guidelines – Always use the battery type recommended by the manufacturer to ensure proper function.

## Take Action: Fire Safety Checklist

With home fire deaths on the rise, it is more important than ever to make fire safety a priority. As you change your clocks on March 9, take a few extra minutes to:

- » Test your smoke alarms to ensure they are working properly.
- » Replace batteries in alarms that require them.
- » Check the manufacture date on all smoke alarms and replace any unit over 10 years old.
- » Remind family and friends to do the same.

## National Flood Insurance Program

For more than 40 years, the City of Portage has actively participated in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), administered by FEMA. The program provides affordable flood insurance to property owners and encourages communities to adopt and administer floodplain management regulations.

As a participant, Portage helps protect structures from flood damage through design and construction standards for Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs). Property owners in these areas can access discounted flood insurance.

The City of Portage Department of Community Development maintains flood maps, base flood elevations (BFE), and other resources to help property owners determine if their property is in or near an SFHA. The department also tracks elevation certificates and Letters of Map Amendment (LOMAs), which can remove properties from designated flood zones.

Most homeowners' insurance policies do not cover flood damage. Special flood insurance is required and is only available in NFIP-participating communities like Portage. If you don't have flood insurance, contact your provider to explore your options.

The Department of Community Development offers:

- » Flood zone determinations based on the latest Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM).
- » Site-specific flood data, including FIRM zones, floodways, and BFEs.
- » Information on mandatory flood insurance requirements for federally backed mortgages.
- » Access to processed Elevation Certificates and LOMAs.

The Spring Cleanup Program and Curbside Brush Collection Program are not performed for commercial establishments, churches or schools or on private streets. The programs can be conducted on private streets, only after every property owner on the private street has signed an indemnification form. Please contact the Department of Public Works at 329-4444 with any questions concerning collection on private streets.


## 2025 Spring Cleanup Program: March 31 - May 1



Every spring, the City of Portage conducts the Spring Cleanup Program, giving residents the opportunity to reduce household clutter and eliminate unwanted household items by placing them at the curb for pickup.

The map below indicates the scheduled pickup date for each neighborhood. Arrows on the map show which side of the street will be picked up when a boundary line falls between different dates. Collection dates and a handy Address Locator Tool are also available at [portagemi.gov/283](http://portagemi.gov/283).

Collection occurs only once in each neighborhood zone, so it is important to place items at the curb by 7 AM on your scheduled pickup date. Materials may be placed curbside up to three days before the collection date.



### Spring Cleanup Program Reminders

- » The City of Portage has no responsibility for items removed from the curbside by private parties.
- » Collection will occur only once in each zone.
- » All accepted items placed at the curb will be collected, so please ensure children's toys are kept clear of this area.
- » Please separate trash and metal at the curb.

### What Items WILL Be Collected?

- » Bed springs and mattresses.
- » Metal – **PILE SEPARATELY**
- » Appliances, including washers, dryers, stoves, and hot water heaters
- » Toilets
- » Lawn and yard equipment – **DRAIN FUEL/OIL**
- » Carpet – **ROLL UP IN LENGTHS OF SIX FEET OR LESS AND LESS THAN 50 POUNDS**
- » Other household items - **BUNDLE, BAG OR BOX IN PARCELS LESS THAN 50 POUNDS**

### What Items WILL NOT Be Collected?

- » Animal waste
- » Brush or leaves (see next page)
- » Wood fences or decking
- » Household garbage
- » Gas or fuel containers
- » Large auto parts
- » Paint and chemicals
- » Railroad ties/landscape timbers
- » TV's, computers & monitors
- » Tires
- » Sand, gravel or sod
- » Broken concrete
- » Scrap building materials from demolition, construction or remodeling
- » Refrigerators, air conditioners and dehumidifiers

It is the responsibility of Portage residents to dispose of the above materials properly. The City of Portage participates in the Kalamazoo County Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Program (see details on the next page). 
## Brush & Bagged Leaf Collection: May 5 - 30

Brush and bagged leaves, including ornamental grasses, will be collected in May as part of the Curbside Brush Collection program. The map below indicates the week that materials will be collected. All materials should be at the curb no later than 7 AM prior to your designated Monday. Residents are reminded that **materials may not be collected on Monday; however, each zone will be cleared of materials by the end of the designated week**. ### How Should I Prepare My Brush/Leaves?

- » Branches 4 feet in length or longer are preferred
- » Branches must be less than 3 inches in diameter
- » Stack in neat piles at curbside
- » Do not cut up Christmas trees
- » Place leaves/ornamental grasses in biodegradable paper bags



### Leaves must be in biodegradable paper bags for the Bagged Leaf Curbside Collection

Leaves in plastic bags will not be collected!

Plastic bags, including decomposing plastic bags, are not permitted for the Bagged Leaf Collection in the City of Portage. Only biodegradable paper bags are allowed, as they naturally break down with exposure to the elements, enabling the complete recycling of both the bag and the leaves inside.



### Why biodegradable paper bags?

- » Composting requires air and moisture, which plastic bags prevent.
- » Federal law prohibits disposing of recyclable yard waste, including leaves in plastic bags, in landfills.
- » Paper bags are sturdy, self-standing, and designed to hold both dry and moist leaves while reducing the risk of tearing.

Please keep each bag under 50 pounds. Biodegradable paper bags are available at most grocery stores, home improvement centers, nurseries, and hardware stores in the lawn and garden section, as well as online.

### Leaf Drop-off Day

The City of Portage Compost Facility will be open on **Saturday, May 31 from 9 AM to 1 PM**. Portage residents may drop off leaves bagged in biodegradable paper yard waste bags and loose brush. The compost facility is located at 10905 Oakland Drive, just south of West Osterhout Avenue. Please be prepared to show proof of Portage residency (driver's license).



## Curbside Recycling Program

The City of Portage is committed to the conservation of natural resources and minimizing the strain on the planet. Through a dedicated, voter-approved millage, the Curbside Recycling Program provides for the bi-weekly collection of recyclable materials at the curbside. - » **Register** to participate in the Curbside Recycling Program
- » **Select a cart size** - 96 or 64 Gallons

### Single-Stream Recycling

Simply place all of your **clean** recyclables in the cart together. Be mindful that depositing soiled materials into the cart can contaminate an entire load of clean recyclable items; compliance with these preparation instructions is essential to the success of the program.

### Bi-Weekly Collection

Recycling is collected every two weeks. The wheeled carts provide adequate space for two weeks' worth of recyclable materials, which means fewer trucks through your neighborhood. More importantly, the collection of materials once every two weeks results in a decrease in fuel consumption and emissions and the wear and tear on city streets.

### Cart Location

Wheel your cart to the street by 6 AM on your collection day. The cart is easy to maneuver to the curb and prevents recyclable materials from being blown around on windy days. Position the cart facing toward the street with a 3-foot clearance from other objects (other carts, mailbox, vehicle).

### Drop-Off Recycling @ Best Way Disposal

Portage residents may visit the Best Way Disposal drop-off facility for a fee of \$5 per cubic yard. All items included in the Curbside Recycling Program are accepted at the drop-off facility located at 2606 Miller Road in Kalamazoo, Monday - Friday, 8 AM - 4:30 PM and Saturdays, 8 AM - 12 PM.

### Food Scraps Recycling Program

The City of Portage is partnering with My Green Michigan to offer a Food Scraps Recycling Pilot Program. The program, provided to Portage citizens at no additional fee, is tailored to turn food scraps into rich, nutrient-dense soil for the environment. Diverting food waste to composting has additional benefits, including reducing pollution and landfill waste, and lowering methane emissions. This pilot program is a part of the city's continuous efforts toward sustainability.

Portage citizens can easily recycle food scraps using a container at home, such as a lidded bowl, compostable bag, plastic container, countertop bin, or 5-gallon bucket. Simply visit one of the 10 convenient drop-off locations on your schedule and deposit your scraps into the 64-gallon lime green bins provided. My Green Michigan will empty the collection bins every other Tuesday.




### Household Hazardous Waste Program

## Election Day Precinct Updates

Exciting changes are coming to voting locations in Portage! Affected voters will receive new Voter ID Cards in the mail soon.

» **Precinct 2 Polling Location Change** – The Calvary Chapel of Kalamazoo Valley Church (formerly Perry Harley Davidson) has been approved as the new polling place for Precinct 2. Voters who previously cast ballots at Golden Tree Apartments Office will now vote at 5331 South Sprinkle Road.

» **Precinct Consolidations** – Following Michigan's Public Act 226 of 2023, precinct boundaries have been adjusted due to increased Early and Absentee Voting. Some precincts have been combined, reducing Election Day polling sites and saving city resources.

For affected voters, new Voter ID Cards will arrive by early March. Please review yours carefully, as your precinct number or polling location may have changed.



## Board of Review Reminder

The City of Portage Board of Review hears property tax valuation appeals from property owners. The board may address property valuation (SEV), assessment roll classification changes, and Property Tax Poverty Exemption requests. The 2025 Annual Assessment Change Notices were mailed the week of February 17, 2025. These notices include:

- » Changes in assessed and taxable values from 2024 to 2025
- » Principal Residence Exemption (PRE) status
- » Whether taxable value was uncapped due to an ownership transfer

If you did not receive your notice, contact the Office of the City Assessor.

For 2025, taxable values may increase by up to 3.1%, based on the Inflation Rate Multiplier (IRM). Changes beyond this limit occur due to new construction, property transfers, or omitted property. Property sales prices are considered but do not solely determine assessed value.

If you believe your property valuation is inaccurate, you may appeal to the Board of Review. The Board will meet with property owners Monday, March 10 through Thursday, March 13. Schedule an appointment by calling 329-4433.

Written appeals can be submitted by 5:30 PM on Wednesday, March 12, 2025 and must include a completed Form L-4035: Petition to the Board of Review (available at [portagemi.gov/156](http://portagemi.gov/156)) and supporting documentation. Submit written appeals via mail, email ([assessingdept@portagemi.gov](mailto:assessingdept@portagemi.gov)), in-person drop-off, or the City Hall 24-hour drop box.
