## A Message from Mayor Patricia M. Randall

Mayor Column June 2025

Everyone likes options. As our two public high schools graduate the 2025 senior classes – Portage Northern (279 ) and Portage Central (335) – students will pursue different paths. Of this year’s graduating class, 95% will attend college and 1% will join the armed services, leaving just 4% to enter into the work force. Expectations run high, but national data tells us that only thirty percent will actually graduate from college: One third with a Masters’ degree and two thirds with Bachelors’ degrees.

What about the other seventy percent? Where will they land and have we done all that we can to equip them with the skills they need to thrive in the future?

Upcoming Junior and Senior students in Kalamazoo County – including each of the public schools and eighteen non-public schools – will have an array of new options next year thanks to Kalamazoo County taxpayers. In 2019, taxpayers approved a millage to pay for a Kalamazoo Regional Educational Service Agency (KRESA) Career Center that will

allow students to explore and train for alternate careers. In 2021, an anonymous donor came forward with a \$100 million gift and the property to build the new KRESA “Career Connect Center.” That generous donation covered the construction and furnishings of the building and accelerated the timeline for the project. The millage will fund all of the operational costs.

This facility will help prepare 1,300 students with exciting career opportunities in well-paying, high-demand and high-growth occupations. Graduates will be equipped with the industry-recognized credentials they need to move directly into the workforce right out of high school.

The new campus will host a continuum of career and technical education programs offering specific skills training and certifications for a variety of occupations. High school students will be able to study architecture and the construction trades including electrical, plumbing, HVAC, ventilation and refrigeration. Health sciences, hospitality and tourism, agriculture, manufacturing and automotive technology, culinary arts, and information technology will also be available. The facility will be centrally located and accessible through our county-wide transportation system. Proximity to various employers will enable them to engage directly with students through internships and work-based

learning opportunities.

This initiative replaces the Education for Employment (EFE) programming offered at various locations for the last 35 years. Other career training options will still be offered throughout our county and will not be duplicated at this new location. They include cosmetology, aviation, accounting, law enforcement, business management, and marketing.

Options will be expanded and futures transformed thanks to the vision and commitment of so many to make this a reality. This proven-to-be-successful alternative to the traditional college path and the enormous debt that comes with it will change many young lives. Hopefully, student graduates armed with these specific skills will enrich our community by choosing to stay and build their families here. Ideally, they will fill the many open trade positions resulting from retirement.

This is yet another shining example of our community coming together to identify and deliver real solutions: Doors open to the first students this fall! As you drive past the site via I-94 or Sprinkle Road, I hope you take pride in knowing that your tax dollars have expanded opportunities for our youth in a very meaningful and lasting way.

## City of Portage Adopts Balanced Budget for Fiscal Year 2025–2026

The Portage City Council has approved a balanced budget for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 that maintains the city’s millage rate, preserving the city’s position in the lower twenty percent (20%) of all Michigan cities with populations between 30,000 and 70,000 in terms of millage level. The budget , which spans from July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026, protects core services and supports infrastructure improvements across the community.

With **no increase in taxes** and no reduction in services, the adopted budget reflects the city’s ongoing commitment to fiscal responsibility and high-quality service delivery. This year’s total proposed expenditures across all 25 city funds total \$106.1 million, a 2.9% increase over the previous fiscal year.

### Key Budget Highlights

#### General Fund

Increased by \$928,000 (3%) to \$36.4 million, largely due to public safety equipment upgrades, inflation-related expenses, and cost-of-living adjustments,.

#### Capital Improvement Program (CIP)

\$23.9 million in project investments, including:

- » *Austin Lake Trail* – \$4.7 million project (90% funded by grants) to construct a three-mile non-motorized trail.
- » *Portage Road/Lake Center Corridor* – \$4.5 for reconstruction of Portage Road between Weatherbee Avenue and Lakeview Drive.
- » *Farmers Market* – Continued work on the upgraded market space.

#### Water Fund

Increased 6% due to planned evaluations for long-term improvements at the Shuman Wellfield.

#### Sewer Fund

Decreased 2%, reflecting the completion of major inspection work last year, offset by increased treatment charges from Kalamazoo.

#### Utility Rates

The budget includes moderate increases in utility rates based on the 2025 Utility Rate Financial Study:

- » Sewer: 8.45% increase
- » Water: 4.96% increase

Combined, this results in an average monthly residential increase of \$5.28.

### A Strong Financial Foundation

The city’s long-term financial stewardship continues to deliver results:

- » Since 2008, the city has reduced its debt burden by 57%, from \$105 million to \$45.2 million.
- » The city holds a strong AA+ bond rating from S&P Global Ratings, one step below the top AAA rating.
- » Taxable value in Portage rose to \$2.797 billion, a 7.21% increase and the highest in city history – Portage remains the municipality with the largest tax base in Kalamazoo County.

The Fiscal Year 2025-2026 budget represents a financially sound path forward, with targeted investments in public safety, infrastructure, and community well-being – without adding new tax burdens. ## City Awards Funding to Human Service Agencies

As part of the FY 2025-2026 budget, the City Council awarded grants to human service agencies that provide essential services to improve the quality of life for individuals and families. Funding comes from the city’s General Fund and the federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program.

The Human Services Board reviews applications and recommends funding allocations based on how well programs meet basic human needs, accessibility to Portage residents, the number of residents served, and outreach efforts. City Council then awards the funds based on these recommendations.

This year, in addition to supporting traditional public services, the city awarded grants for “opioid remediation” through the National Opioid Settlement. Funding was allocated to four Portage Public Schools programs focused

on prevention education, harm reduction, and recovery support – part of a broader effort to combat substance use disorders in the community.

City Council approved the allocation of funds as shown in the table. Portage has awarded these grants annually for over 20 years, demonstrating an ongoing commitment to residents’ well-being and public health. The city’s investment in opioid prevention and recovery underscores its dedication to addressing this pressing public health issue.

# Protecting Portage Waterways: A Citizen’s Guide to Stormwater Management

Stormwater might seem harmless, but it plays a major role in local water pollution. When rain falls or snow melts, water flows across hard surfaces like driveways and sidewalks,

picking up pollutants along the way. This untreated runoff enters storm drains and flows directly into nearby wetlands, rivers, ponds, and lakes.

Unlike household wastewater – which goes to a treatment plant – stormwater is not cleaned before reaching our natural waterways. It can carry salt, fertilizer, oil, pet waste, and other debris, threatening local ecosystems and public health.

## Common Stormwater Pollutants

**1. PESTICIDES**  
Pesticides are toxic chemicals that are harmful to the watersheds and environment when not used or disposed of properly.

**2. LITTER**  
By not disposing of your trash properly, it will eventually become litter and make its way into our storm drains and contaminate local and distant waterways.

**3. MOTOR OIL**  
When oil leaks are not fixed, the toxic oil will find its way to our watershed, and often harms plants and animals it meets.

**4. PET WASTE**  
Pet waste carries bacteria, viruses, and parasites to our water that can threaten the health of humans and wildlife.

**5. SOAPS/DETERGENTS (from car wash)**  
Washing cars in our driveways creates soapy runoff that picks up pollutants and eventually makes its way to rivers untreated via storm drains.

## What Else Pollutes Our Water?

One significant threat is fecal coliform bacteria, such as E. coli, which indicates the presence of disease-causing organisms. These bacteria live in the digestive systems of humans and animals and can enter waterways through leaking sanitary sewer systems or misconnected pipes.

During major storms, cracks in the sewer system may allow stormwater to flow into sanitary sewers, overwhelming treatment plants and causing sewage overflows. These issues are costly and complex, but the City of Portage and its partners work continuously to fix them and protect our waterways.

## Five Simple Ways to Help

You can help prevent stormwater pollution with just a few everyday actions:

### 1. Wash your car on your lawn or at a car wash.

Runoff from driveway washing contains oil and grime that harm aquatic life. Grass filters these pollutants, and you'll water your lawn at the same time.

### 2. Check for vehicle leaks.

Oil and fuel from cars can easily be washed into storm drains and flow untreated into lakes and rivers.

### 3. Use lawn chemicals sparingly.

Sweep grass clippings away from storm drains and avoid over-applying fertilizer and pesticides, which are major sources of water pollution.

### 4. Pick up after your pets.

Pet waste contains bacteria and parasites that can wash directly into our waterways if left on the ground.

### 5. Only rain down the drain.

Never dump trash, chemicals, or yard waste into a storm drain. Even small actions make a big difference.

# July Curbside Brush Collection Begins July 7 in Zone 1

Curbside brush collection begins in Zone 1 on Monday, July 7. Residents should place brush and branches at the curb by 7 AM on the Monday of the scheduled collection week (see zone map for dates).

Branches must be between 4 and 6 feet long and less than 3 inches in diameter, and should be stacked in neat piles at the curb. Each street will be cleared only once, and crews will not return to collect brush placed out late.

To help crews and prevent lawn damage caused by heavy equipment, residents are asked to move brush to the edge of the curb on the Monday of their collection week. Brush may also be placed directly in the street, as long as it does not block traffic or pedestrian use of the roadway. A small amount of debris may remain after collection, and residents are encouraged to assist with light cleanup of any leftover material.

# A Friendly Reminder About Tall Grass and Weeds

Portage residents are reminded of the importance of property maintenance activities. Desirable, high-quality neighborhoods are key to Portage remaining *A Natural Place to Move!*

Please take time to properly maintain your property by controlling weeds and keeping lawns mowed on a regular basis. Growth in excess of eight inches in height is prohibited by city ordinance and the International Property Maintenance Code (IPMC). Failure to comply could result in fees associated with a contractor mowing the property.

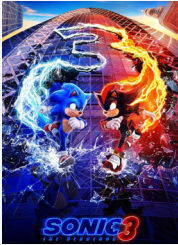

This open house is an important step in advancing the Portage Road 360 initiative, which builds on the Lake Center District Subarea Plan, part of the city’s 2024 Master Plan, to create a safe, accessible, and vibrant corridor for all.

At Open House #4, the city’s Portage Road 360 planning specialists will present new materials highlighting feedback gathered through ongoing community engagement efforts. Engineering consultants will

share their recommended preliminary corridor designs, featuring street cross-sections, multi-user paths, intersection layouts, and traffic-calming elements informed by public input and traffic research.

### Portage Road 360 Projected Construction Schedule

- » Forest Drive Traffic Signal – Fall 2025
- » Wetherbee Avenue to Lakeview Drive – 2026
- » Lakeview Drive to Forest Drive/Zylman Avenue – 2027
- » Forest Drive/Zylman Avenue to Centre Avenue – 2028

Attendees can also explore a variety of interactive stations and speak directly with project specialists to help prioritize design features such as site furnishings, lighting, gateway elements, pavement treatments, landscaping, and green infrastructure strategies.
