Leaf-A-Legacy: Restoring Our Canopy, One Tree at a Time

In the aftermath of the devastating May 7, 2024 tornado, the City of Portage, with support from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR), continues its mission to restore the city's tree canopy and green spaces. The storm caused widespread damage, resulting in the loss of thousands of trees across parks and neighborhoods.

A heartfelt thank you to all our supporters!

On September 26, 2025, volunteers and community partners including the MDNR, the Kalamazoo Nature Center, Mulders Nursery, Graphic Packaging International, the Kalamazoo Growlers, Kalamazoo Landscape Supplies, and the City of Portage joined together to plant 25 additional trees at Celery Flats. During the event, volunteers learned about best practices for tree planting and contributed to our goal of planting 400 trees over the next two years through the Leaf-A-Legacy campaign.

Grants Available for Agencies Supporting Portage Citizens in Need

The City of Portage is accepting applications for its annual Human Services Grant Program, which provides funding to nonprofit agencies that help Portage residents meet essential housing and living needs.

Each year, the city allocates a portion of its General Fund to organizations offering services such as home repairs for seniors, emergency housing assistance, food and clothing distribution, and transportation to work or medical appointments. These programs help residents maintain stable housing and improve quality of life.

For Fiscal Year 2026-2027, funding will be available beginning July 1, 2026. While the total amount has not yet been determined, the city allocated \$216,000 for the current fiscal year.

Few municipalities provide this type of support, but the Portage City Council views it as a meaningful reinvestment of tax dollars back into the community.

Eligibility and Criteria

Nonprofit agencies in the greater Kalamazoo area may apply if their services directly benefit low-income Portage residents. Qualifying programs must address housing or related needs and demonstrate accessibility, outreach, and impact for Portage citizens. Agencies must also show the ability to obtain or leverage other funding. (Startup programs are not eligible.)

No Roosters, Please: What You Should Know About Keeping Chickens in Portage

Backyard chickens are becoming more popular across Michigan, and Portage is no exception. Residents who want to raise hens for fresh eggs can do so, but there's one important rule right up front: **roosters are not allowed anywhere in the city.**



Why no roosters? They're noisy! Unlike hens, roosters crow throughout the day (and sometimes night), which can disturb neighbors. Plus, roosters aren't needed for hens to lay eggs

— hens will happily produce eggs on their own. The city's ordinance allows hens only, to give residents the benefits of backyard eggs without the early morning wake-up calls.

The Basics

- » Up to six hens may be kept at a single-family home.
- » Chickens must be for personal use only, not for sale or commercial purposes.
- » A permit from the City of Portage is required before you bring chickens home. If you rent, you'll need written permission from the property owner.

Where and How to Keep Them

- » Chickens must stay in the rear yard inside a secure coop and pen at night. During the day, hens may roam a fenced-in area (at least four feet tall) if supervised.

- » The coop and pen must be safe, clean, and well-built – no tarps, scrap materials, or metal sheeting allowed.
- » Structures must be set back at least 10 feet from property lines and 30 feet from neighboring homes (40 feet if you live on a lakefront lot).

Keep It Clean and Neighbor-Friendly

- » Feed must be stored so it doesn't attract rodents.
- » Coops should be cleaned regularly to prevent odors or pests.
- » Outdoor slaughtering of chickens is prohibited
- » Chickens can't create noise, odor, or sanitation problems that affect neighboring properties.

Verification Underway for Recently Completed Home Projects

Each fall, the Office of the City Assessor reviews recently completed home improvement projects – like new decks, finished basements, sheds, garages, additions, in-ground pools – to ensure that property records remain accurate. If your project required a building permit, staff from the Assessor's Office may visit your property to verify the completion of the project and details of the work.

Accurate property data helps ensure fair and equitable assessments for all Portage property owners.

Verification may include exterior measurements and updated photographs. In many cases, a full in-person visit by an appraiser is not necessary. Instead, visit portagemi.gov/155 or scan the QR code and complete the online Permit Inspection form.

If you prefer to schedule an appointment, please call 329-4433 or email assessingdept@portagemi.gov. Staff are happy to answer any questions about your property assessment.

Please note: Assessing staff verifications are separate from inspections conducted by the Department of Community Development, which focus on safety standards and building code compliance.


Portage Launches New Rental Hub for Renters and Landlords

Get a Permit to Harvest Downed Timber in Tornado Affected Areas

Portage residents can now apply for Fuel Wood Harvest Permits as part of the city's Timber Harvest Program, launching November 1, 2025. The program offers residents the chance to collect firewood from designated areas while supporting sustainable forest management.

This initiative helps keep Portage's city forests healthy, removes downed trees from the May 2024 tornado, and promotes the growth of native tree species. Forestry professionals have carefully reviewed harvest areas to ensure long-term forest health and environmental protection.

The city has partnered with American Arbor, a local company, to perform large-scale tree remediation on tornado-damaged properties. Fuel Wood Harvest Permits will be coordinated with these efforts to maintain safety and efficiency.

Harvesting will occur during the fall months to minimize the risk of spreading tree diseases such as oak wilt. Residents may notice temporary equipment noise or restricted access in some areas during active harvests. The city will notify the public in advance of any major impacts.

Permit holders must follow all rules and conditions to ensure safety and environmental stewardship.

has grown from 12 vendors and 5,000 visitors per season to over 30 vendors and 30,000 visitors annually.

The new site will feature three open-air pavilions with 50 covered vendor stalls, ADA-compliant walkways, a performance space, picnic areas, and food truck space. This \$3.25 million project, funded by a combination of a \$1.75 million State of Michigan grant, a \$1 million philanthropic pledge, and city contributions, will ensure the market continues to thrive as a hub for local farmers, small businesses, and community connections. Construction began this fall, with the new market scheduled to open in spring 2026.

Lexington Green Park Ribbon-Cutting

On October 10, the city celebrated the completion of the newly renovated Lexington Green Park at 4750 Pittsford Avenue with a ribbon-cutting ceremony. The renovations include a new playground, a pavilion area, heated restrooms, and a lighted walking loop trail. Residents played an active role in shaping the upgrades, making the park a true community space. This \$1,770,000 project was funded by a Michigan Department of Natural Resources grant, Community Development Block Grant funds and the city's Capital Improvement Program.
